SPRING GARDEN

January is the time to start thinking about your spring garden. This cold time of year is the perfect time to get your soil sampled, soil amended, seeds ordered (before they sell out), garden planned, and even starting transplants.

Soil Sample bags and forms can be obtained at the Jasper County Extension Office. Upon receiving soil sample results don't hesitate to call our office and get help in understanding what the soil sample says.

Starting your transplants. When we talk seed starting and transplants we are primarily focused on starting peppers and tomatoes indoors 6-8 weeks prior to the last frost date (*March 15*). When starting your seeds indoors a couple problems we typically face is overwatering your seedlings and not providing enough lighting this can lead to the soil growing mold, and your transplants becoming leggy.
